
Did You Know?

the fall of the Western Roman Empire and merged into the Renaissance and the Age of Discovery.





Silhouettes of Stonehenge





In Year 3 we have had lots of fun studying the Neolithic times. The children created silhouettes of Stonehenge, the most famous Neolithic monument in the world. In Design and Technology we have learned how to make Neolithic axes from papier-mâché.







Did You Know?

The Neolithic, the final division of the Stone Age, began about 12,000 years ago when the first developments of farming appeared in the Epipalaeolithic Near East, and later in other parts of the world.



The Romans

The children took part in a Roman Day, where they researched key figures and places from Ancient Rome, designed their own mosaics and marched like a Roman army! The children made a huge effort with their costumes, they all looked super!





They enjoyed working in groups, showing true FCJ Companionship to learn about an aspect of the Roman times in depth. They then taught the rest of the class and shared what they had learnt.



De Putron Challenge

This year the De Putron Challenge was a digital event with the theme of 'Dear Future'. The Year 6 children have loved taking part in three unique challenges over three consecutive weeks. The first challenge was titled 'The Power of Knowledge', where the children took part in an online quiz. Questions focussed on Geography, Science and the Environment. The second challenge was called the 'Rise of the Robots'. The children had to explore how a popular mini game called 'Bloons Tower Defence' was made. Then, through a coding activity, the children had to make their own shooting monkey tower. The last of the three challenges was a creative writing piece, where the

children had to pitch a futuristic product to improve the Channel Islands, or solve a local issue. Below is a preview of our FCJ submission for this challenge.

WHAT'S THE PROBLEM

The problem in Jersey is our beaches and oceans are being polluted with plastic.The States assembly quoted, "Plastic which is littered in the environment is a great cause for concern."

The JEP also stated, "Plastic in the sea can harm fish,birds and even humans." The JEP also reported, "while the tide may make the tide disappear from sight, it hasn't gone away."

OUR SOLUTION

- We have come up with a solution, it is a robot that can suck up plastic from underneath, it will be able to suck up plastic by finding propylene which is a mineral in plastic that nothing natural can make.
- It turns the plastic into synthesis gas that then can be turned into petrol, diesel and electricity ;however for environmental reasons we are only going to produce sustainable energy.
- The robot has sensors to pick up plastic from the beach and it uses the electricity it makes to power it too keep going





Due to covid precautions, it has been confirmed that we will no longer be able to access the canteen at Grainville for hot meals.

We have met with Caring Cooks, who have taken over the catering contract for government secondary schools and remain hopeful that we will be able to offer hot meals, within school at some stage in the future.

This would require funding in order to put the infrastructure in place that would be required, as well as ensuring that we fulfil all the stringent health, safety and hygiene requirements. We will continue to work on this objective, realistically however, we are now looking to the longer term, due to

the complex nature of this project.



Thank you for your continued cooperation and support in making the end of day collection as safe as possible. We ask that all parents drive as slowly as possible within the school environs and please follow directions from our staff. Please remember to display your school parking disc and to turn hazard lights on to indicate that you are ready to leave. As you drive towards the barrier, you may be asked to wait to enable pedestrians safe access and exit along this route. Please do be mindful that our youngest children, as well as the Key Stage 2 bus children, use the crossing in front of the minibuses on a daily basis; you may also be asked to wait at this junction until it is safe to continue through the barrier. 

household is experiencing symptoms is putting children and staff at significant risk.





KS2 - Children of the World












