Rights Respecting School

On November 22nd, FCJ (along with many schools worldwide) celebrated the 30th Anniversary of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child. It was a fantastic day where our children took part in a variety of activities that directly linked to their rights. Our Ambassadors planned and led a fantastic and informative assembly, and the Year 5 and 6 children even taught mini lessons to our younger children. A day full of true companionship! A really important part of the day was where the children learnt about the 'Jersey Children First' campaign, where the Government have made a series of pledges to support and protect young people in Jersey. All children then wrote their own pledges about how they can act to protect and promote the rights of children globally. We have made a 'Wall of Pledges', and are so grateful to the parents and staff who shared their own pledge.





The children were so interested in the pledge concept that two of our children wrote a letter to Senator Sam Mezec (Minister for Children and Housing) and he subsequently came to visit us on Monday 16th December. He led our KS2 assembly, where the children asked many interesting questions. Our Rights Respecting Ambassadors team took Senator Mezec on a brief tour of the school, so that he could see our Wall of Pledges. He was very impressed and said he can't wait to return to FCJ when we achieve our Gold Rights Respecting Award!

There will be medals for the top 3 in each age category (subject to 5 in each section minimum) and trophies for the top 3 girls who do not win a trophy in any of the other categories.

Participants are asked to bring a snack for the afternoon snack break. No NUTS please. A pop up cafe will be available.

T&Cs

Graham Mooney, FIDE Arbiter notes, rules and some suggestions below:

- Each player should shake hands with their opponent both before and after the game.
- Whilst winning is nice, equally as important is being courteous and respectful to your opponent.
- Normal chess rules will apply with each player having 10 minutes to make all moves.
- Touch move is in operation. Should you touch your own or an opponents piece and not say "adjust" or "j'adoube" then you must move that piece or capture your opponent's piece if it is a legal move.
- Each round will last no longer than 20 minutes, with a further 5 minutes between rounds for the next draw to be made. If you finish your game early then please remain silent until all other games are complete. There will be 20 minutes for a snack break and toilet breaks can be taken in between rounds. All players will play between 6-7 different opponents over the course of the afternoon. For any players that have never played in a chess tournament before, you should not worry, as, after a few rounds, you will get used to it and the adults from the chess club are there to help you.
- The organisers have responsibility for the children in the playing hall only.
