Then, we learnt about the story of Jonah and the Whale to consider our actions and how we can help others follow the Word of God. We made good comparisons between the two stories to explore what they taught us. We had a great time role playing these stories too!

When celebrating Marie Madeleine's birthday, we came up with our own project of raising awareness for the 'Grace Crocker Foundation'. We look forward to working on this project this year.





Year 4

In Year 4 we have fully emersed ourselves in our RE learning during September. As part of our celebrations for Marie Madeleine's birthday we explored what is like to have courage and confidence and how we can develop these traits just like Marie Madaline our FCJ foundress.

We have also been on a trip to St. Luke's Church to visit the view the Earth Day icon. This was created by a local artist Karen Blampied and focuses on elements of the Bible story of Creation. It features over 101 endangered species. This helped us to consider how we can be stewards of God's creation. We were very grateful to Chris Knight for giving her time to share this with us. Year 6

This half-term, the children have explored what it means to be the 'People of God' through the eyes of Moses, by considering their Big Question: 'Is It Easy Being One of the People of God?' We have considered that we exist in a world created by God, and that we can exercise our freedom to deepen our relationship with Him and overcome the barriers of jealousy and disharmony. The children have deeply reflected on why we need to follow God's law and by upholding the commandments, we uphold the will of God. Upholding the will of God involves personal choices and often sacrifices. The nature of these sacrifices has also been explored by the children and how that makes them 'People of God'.
